Message from the Board of Directors

This has been a year of unprecedented challenges. This has been particularly true for childcare and EarlyON Child and Family Centres, and certainly, Child Care Algoma has been no exception. 2020 was a year unlike any we've experienced and is a year that demands to be documented, but also aches to be forgotten. As the situation continuously evolved over the last year, the team at Child Care Algoma has displayed leadership, dedication and flexibility as they rose to the many challenges presented by COVID-19 and the ongoing changes the pandemic has required.

Our staff have taken steps beyond what we've ever been required to do to meet the needs of children and their families and they have done so with care and professionalism and everyone's safety as a top priority. In short, we have risen to the challenge and are moving forward stronger and more determined.

Leading into the pandemic, our child care centres were in a position of strength, both financially and in terms of culture, community and programming. The dedicated team and staff leveraged this strong position. They created new ways of teaching, improved the physical safety of our childcare centres and planned various scenarios for how child care would continue. They thought through how best to deliver a learning environment that took into account the health and wellbeing of our children and their families.

As we end the year in the midst of a pandemic, Child Care Algoma is also pleased to highlight some accomplishments from the last year. At the Echo Bay Learning and Care Program, we introduced an infant program and relocated to a newly renovated child care space within the Echo Bay school. At the R.M. Moore Early Learning and Care Program, we relocated from a one classroom preschool program to a new addition at R.M. Moore school that now offers infant, toddler and preschool care. Another positive accomplishment of 2020 included offering Emergency Child Care to eligible families at the Dacey Road site as well as with some home child care providers. Our EarlyON Child and Family Centres and the Community Action Program for Children (CAPC), shifted from in-person programming to support families, to providing contactless drop-off kits/food boxes and other learning opportunities as well as offering Zoom and Facebook live programming.

On behalf of our Board of Directors, I would like to express our sincere gratitude to all of the

staff of Child Care Algoma for their unwavering dedication, professionalism and commitment to the children and the families we serve as well as to the families who have chosen Child Care Algoma as their trusted child care provider. As always, our children and families are our inspiration, motivating us to strengthen the foundations for learning, behaviour and health of all children for future success.

Executive Director's Message

"Learn from yesterday, live for today, hope for tomorrow."
– Albert Einstein –

I am certain everyone will agree 2020 will be a year that many of us will not soon forget. The global pandemic has transformed the world as we knew it and unfortunately our tomorrow and "*new*" normal is yet to be uncovered. Amidst the various challenges this pandemic has triggered, Child Care Algoma, as a sector leader, persevered and became more resilient to our commitment to superior programs and services while also executing enhanced measures for the <u>safety</u> and <u>well being</u> of children, families and employees.

As I composed this report it was difficult not to place a high concentration on how demanding this year was. Navigating the pandemic and the various uncertainties that it generated did present the Child Care Algoma team with

some reservations; however in situations of unfamiliarity, it is common to experience some level of apprehension. Although we needed to live, learn and engage with each other differently we came together and worked through the challenges with strong outcomes.

As you may recall licensed child care centres were legally required to close on March 17, 2020 when Ontario ordered a declaration of emergency and the complete child care system was abruptly in disarray. The Ministry of Education worked with service system managers to open select emergency child care centres to support health care and other essential workers. With much gratitude to Child Care Algoma employees that consented to work we opened an Emergency Child Care Program at our Dacey Road Site. As of June 12, 2020, the government permitted child care centres to reopen throughout the province, under enhanced health and safety protocols. As such, emergency child care ended. We shifted from existing routines and needed to adapt to innovative approaches and practices of collaborating, learning and working to ensure that each person was safe and cared for. I feel it is important to emphasize that our early learning environments and our EarlyON Child and Family Centres continued in ways unconceivable a year earlier. Educators, children and families needed to adapt to overwhelming change. We acquired new language and behaviours to collectively minimize the risk of the COVID-19 virus; such as wearing personal protective equipment, appropriate physical distancing etiquette, enhanced hand hygiene and developing and adhering to strict guidelines, policies and procedures developed in collaboration with the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education, Child Care sector partners and the undeniable support from the Algoma Public Health.

Despite the tumultuous roller-coaster we have been travelling over the last several months. I am proud to share with you our 2020 Annual Report. It will provide a comprehensive summary of accomplishments we did conquer and an overview of our notable 2020 year! Some of which are as follows;

- February 2020: We moved from a single classroom at R.M. Moore School to a brand new addition and increased spaces to include infant and toddler care.
- March 2020: We expanded our program in Echo Bay to offer infant care in a newly renovated space.
- ♦ April June 2020: Offered an Emergency Child Care Program to eligible families at our Dacey Road Site. Some Home Child Care Providers also offered ECC to their families.
- ◆ July 2020 In partnership with Algoma District School Board we relocated the Northern Heights Outreach Site to the Boreal French Immersion School Site.
- September 2020: Re-located the preschool and toddler program in Echo Bay to a new a child care space.

I

- EarlyON Child and Family Centres / Community Action Program for Children needed to transition from in person programming to support children and families to virtual ZOOM and Facebook live programming. For families in need we also conducted contactless deliveries of food boxes, personal care items and activity kits.
- We developed and implemented significant regulations, policies and procedures associated with COVID-19 to ensure environments, children, families and employees were protected.
- We achieved clear license renewals, both virtually and in-person.
- We continued to support the Agency's affiliated Home Child Care Program, the Home Child Care Providers and their premises.

This was an extraordinary year and our accomplishments could not have been achieved if it were not for the endless hours of work and attentiveness from Neill Malcolm – Manager of Finance and Information Systems, Talia Bruno - Manager of Programs and Human Resources and Program Co-ordinators, Suzanne Manson, Jennifer Parrella, Diana Taranto and Kelly Rowlinson. I am so appreciative for your determination, individual expertise and allegiance to the organization, children and families. You each play such a critical role in the overall management of this organization and I am very thankful for your support.

I must also recognize the true champions of 2020. To Child Care Algoma's front line workers, to include the Early Childhood Educators, EarlyON teams, Cooks, Administrative, Maintenance, Home Child Care Providers and Support Staff; a *profound thank you*. I must also make special mention to those employees that came forward to offer Emergency Child Care. It is without question that the efforts by all, through these very stressful times will always be appreciated and recognized. You have stepped up each and every day, despite the risks, to ensure quality, safe programs and services were available to families. Child Care Algoma exists because of you!

Additionally, I would like to acknowledge the ongoing assistance and support received from the District Sault Ste. Marie Social Service Administration Board, the Algoma District Social Services Administration Board, the Ministry of Education and other Community partners. A distinctive mention to the Algoma Public Health team for their contributions and valued support that was available to us whenever needed.

Furthermore, I extend our most sincere appreciation to our parents and families for their patience and understanding and for trusting Child Care Algoma in caring for your children during this unprecedented time. Your confidence in our programs and services has been both impactful and crucial to our success.

Finally, thank you to our Board of Directors for bringing their passion, intellect, insight, experience and resources to the table. The many volunteer hours you devote to this Agency are greatly appreciated.

As we continue to navigate this world-wide pandemic, I believe our future is not without additional hardships. I will however, remain confident that as we have endured complex circumstances before, we have the determination to do what is needed for continual success. We will proceed focussing on this as an opportunity to nurture different ways of existing, based on what we have already experienced, and what we know we need to do as we move forward. We always knew our achievements were dependent upon our united strengths and efforts and this year has certainly proved this to be more accurate than ever before!

History

In **1982**, Sault Ste. Marie Day Care Services was incorporated as a Co-operative Corporation. The agency started from a small office on Queen Street with a private home day care office purchasing services from twenty five providers. The agency later opened a small Parent Resource Centre with a toy lending library.

In **1988** Sault Ste. Marie Day Care Services opened it's doors at 148 Dacey Road offering families a child care program, the private home day care office with additional providers and a parent/child resource centre with a toy lending library.

In **1991** we opened the Queen Street Child Care Program. This location also provided for administration support to Private Home Day Care (currently known as Home Child Care).

In **1993** Child Care Services were expanded to meet the needs of the community of Thessalon and surrounding areas.

In 1995 Sault Ste. Marie Day Care Services changed it's name to Child Care Algoma.

In **1997** Child Care Algoma assumed responsibility for the French language licensed Child Care and Family Resource Program; Le Carrousel des Amis.

In 1998 Child Care Algoma opened the Station Mall Family Resource Program.

In 1999 R.M. Moore Child Care program was opened in the R.M. Moore Public School.

In **2001** Child Care Algoma assumed responsibility for the Algoma Co-Operative Children's Services. This program includes the Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program and the Community Action Program for Children.



Holy Cross Early Learning and Care Program

In **2003** we became the lead Agency for the Best Start Hubs. The official grand opening occurred June 24, 2003 at the Station Mall location. In addition, Satellite programs are located across the community.

In **2008** and in conjunction with the local Best Start Network, Child Care Algoma made a commitment to support the Best Start initiative and offer programming at Holy Angels School, Dacey Road, École Notre-Dame-Du-Sault and Prince Township.

In 2010 Child Care Algoma introduced infant programs at our Queen Street East and Dacey Road locations.

In **2012** we offered programming at the *new* Holy Cross School to include, a Best Start Hub, a Toddler, Preschool and a Before and After School program. This model follows the Province's vision of a seamless system for children from birth to school age.

A Before & After School Program also opened at F.H. Clergue French Immersion School.

In 2014 the Thessalon Early Learning and Care Program relocated to the Thessalon Public School.

In **2015** an infant program opened at 115 Shannon Road. We also expanded the preschool playground to include a large play space in a new natural setting.

In 2017 we opened a new Infant, Toddler, Preschool and Extended Day Program at the St. Basil School location.

In **2018** we opened a new Extended Day Program at Grand View School. Dacey Road Early Leaning and Care Program expanded to accommodate 3 additional infant spaces. Parkland Early Learning and Care Program also expanded to offer new infant spaces, additional toddler and preschool spaces. In May we celebrated the "Official Openings" of the following EarlyON Child and Family Centres; St. Basil School Site, Northern Heights School Site and River View School Site. Holy Cross School Site, Holy Angels and École Notre-Dame-Du-Sault School Site were included in the celebrations.

In **2019** we opened a new Extended Day Program at Queen Elizabeth School. In September we celebrated the official launch of the EarlyON Mobile Hub. The Mobile Hub is the first of its kind in Northern Ontario and this service will allow Child Care Algoma to provide further opportunities for children, parents and caregivers in our community while it also supports the Ministry of Education's vision for an integrated, cohesive system of services and supports.

In **2020**, we re-located from a single classroom at R. M. Moore School to our own newly constructed wing of the school. We expanded this program to include infant and toddler spaces. We also experienced a move within Echo Bay School. We increased spaces to include infant care in a newly renovated program.

We have grown to offer a wide range of Early Learning and Care Programs to include Infant, Toddler, Preschool and Extended Day Care, as well as EarlyON Child and Family Centres. We employ many staff and remain the largest child care service provider in the District of Algoma.



2020 Program Highlights

Family and community form the foundation for children's development. Families know their children best, and are the most powerful influence on their learning and development. We invite families to participate in their children's experiences, which ignites their interest in learning.

We strive to create environments and experiences where children and families explore, question and learn together. We provide consistent yet flexible programs where children and families learn through hands-on involvement.

Family Connection

Wednesday evening programming for the months of January, February and March, families were invited to enjoy a nutritional meal which provided an opportunity to enrich adult-child interactions and social connections.

Newcomer Drop-In Program

Families new to the City of Sault Ste. Marie were welcomed to join us to participate in our daily programming for the month of February. Staff and families engaged in languages spoken in Arabic, Turkish & Kurdish. Early learning activity and nutritious snack were provided.

Be our Guest and Join us for Lunch

Tuesdays and Thursdays families visited and were served a nutritious lunch for the months of January and February. Lunch was prepared by United Way's Harvest Algoma.

Monthly Good Food Box Draw in Partnership with S.S.M. Soup Kitchen Community Centre Good Food Box monthly draw was provided. Food box consisted of fresh produce and was delivered to the winner's home from January to March.

Breastfeeding and Babywearing Support and Chat

Trained La Leche League of Canada and Babywearing of Algoma Volunteer shared up-to-date breastfeeding/ chestfeeding information, encouragement and support in the months of January, February and March. Babywearing support and guidance was offered promoting the enjoyment of babywearing.

In response to COVID-19, EarlyON Child and Family Centres were closed in early March 2020. We were fortunate to be able to continue to support children and families during these unprecedented times with various programs and resources including virtual programming.

During our Virtual 2020 programing we had 1,513 responses engaged in our Social Media virtual programming and challenges

Family Meal Kits

Family Meal kits were made available for the months of November and December on Wednesday evenings. 93 Take Home Family Kits were offered to families.

Bagged Lunches in Partnership with Soup Kitchen Community Centre

Each Wednesday for the months of November and December, 50 bagged lunches weekly were distributed to families. A total of 400 bagged lunches were distributed.

2020 R.J.'s Market Good Food Box Draw (May to October 2020)

Each week, a Facebook "challenge" was posted for families. During the week, they were encouraged to share their ideas/participation with us via private Facebook message or comments for their chance to win our weekly draw. **35 RJ's Food Boxes were distributed.**

Triple P

Certified Practitioners in the **Triple P Positive Parenting Program** continue to create a positive, caring relationship between children and families offering a range of ways to deliver positive parenting, from single visit consultations to public seminars, group courses and private sessions. **Virtual Triple P Seminar Series Online Evening Event** was offered on the Power of Positive Parenting for parents of children up to 10 years old. Seminar #1 ~The Power of Positive Parenting, Seminar #2 ~ Raising Confident, Competent Children and, Seminar #3 ~ Raising Resilient Children.

A total of 155 Adults participated in various Triple P programs.

Community Hubs Summer Time Activities & Food Distribution (July & August 2020)

Summer weekly deliveries to Shannon/Capp, Adrian Drive, Boston Ave as well as Chapple Albion was completed over the summer months and consisted of age appropriate activities and child friendly snacks. 552 Nutritious Snacks, 664 Activities and 112 Parent Self Care Kits were all distributed.

Virtual Welcome for Re-Opening October 2020

Programs began welcoming children and families back for indoor, in-person services. Pre-registration was required through <u>www.keyon.ca</u> .If families needed assistant they were able to call the EarlyON Centre and someone would help to register the families for a drop-in session.

Upon any arrival to any of the EarlyON programs, families were permitted one at a time to complete the screening process. The **Child Care Algoma EarlyON Team** decided to create a Virtual Welcome Video for families at <u>https://spark.adobe.com/video/3pecUzZIblskP</u> to welcome and share the changes with families.

EarlyON Holiday Meal Kit Pick Ups

Upon re-opening the programs on October 19, 2020 we transitioned our regular Wednesday evening Family Dinner program to consist of a Family Meal Kit. During the month of December it included dinner options as well as breakfast ideas to support families over the Holiday season.

During the month of December, 48 Adults, 99 Children were served.

EarlyON Activity Kit Pick Ups

Activity Kits were created as away to support families who many not be able to attend in person for various reasons. These included craft and activity ideas as well as baking experiences for the children and families. **11 various activity options were provided and 73 Adults 100 Children served as a part of this program.**

Community Christmas for Children

This year represented the 30th Season of Community Christmas for Children and the calendar was made available virtually. The Calendar included a combination of virtual programming, Holiday pick up kits and in program activities from December 7, 2020 until January 4, 2021.

The **Community Christmas for Children Calendar of events listed 48 activities** along with some additional options of where to find virtual programming for children and families.

Francophone Services

French Fridays and Virtual French Video sessions continue to be successful creating opportunities where French speaking families can practice their language and culture. We encouraged participation through videos of seasonal and theme based songs, experiences and role plays to promote exposure to the French language. Children were encouraged to practice their French vocabulary and complete fun tasks based on the theme of the session and share them with us.

French Infant Massage Our certified **Infant Massage** instructor offered a French Infant Massage program in building on the importance of attachment through the stimulating form of touch that nourishes the relationship between the parent and child.

Program Feature of the Year

Early Learning and Care Program R.M. Moore Site

Finally after 20 years of occupying a single classroom at R.M. Moore Public School we were very excited to move into our new beautiful space in February of 2020. We went from a one classroom Preschool Program to a Program with an Infant, Toddler and Preschool Room. We also continue to run our JK/SK

Extended Day Program and our School Age Program.

Although the year has been filled with many challenges it has also been filled with so many amazing learning and growing experiences.

With our expansion we are thrilled to be able to provide quality care to many more new families in our community.



Early Learning and Care Program Echo Bay Site



In March of 2020 the Echo Bay Early Learning and Care was ecstatic to finally offer infant care to the families in our community and surrounding area. Our revised license now includes 10 infants. That was not all that happened in 2020 in Echo Bay; after many delays (some due to COVID lock down), the senior end of the school was renovated to accommodate a new space for the child care program.

At the end of August the toddler and preschool programs moved into our own space, which has allowed us our own entrances, additional toilets and sinks for the children and easier access to our playgrounds. The children and staff have settled in nicely to our new space and we are hoping

to sometime in the future offer an open house for our families and the community to come inside and see first hand our learning environments.

Thessalon Preschool Early Learning & Care Program

Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program Central Algoma / North Shore

The Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program supports pregnant women in giving their child the best start in life by providing them with access to milk, nutritional food and information on healthy living and eating during and after their pregnancy. The goals of the program are to improve the health of pregnant women, support the healthy development of the fetus, reduce the number of

babies born with unhealthy birth weights, promote breastfeeding and motherbaby attachment, and increase the accessibility of services for pregnant women. The CPNP program is offered to pregnant mothers in need living in communities along the North Shore from Echo Bay to Blind River.

The program is funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada and administered in partnership with Algoma Public Health and Algoma Family Services.

In 2020 46 women and infants were supported.




